## WISCONSIN WOMEN LEGISLATORS – A HISTORICAL LIST

In the years since the first three women were elected as “assemblymen” in 1925, a total of 86 women have held seats in the Wisconsin Legislature, including 33 who will serve in the 2001 Legislature. The largest number of women to serve in a single session were the 36 members of the 1993 Legislature.

This brief summarizes the service of Wisconsin women legislators. Section I lists all the women members alphabetically by house and indicates their party, district, occupation, and terms of service. Section II lists the members serving in each session.

### The Senate

The 11 women elected to the 2001 Senate make up exactly one-third of that 33-member body. One is new to the senate. All have previous legislative experience, and all have served in both houses.

In 1975, Kathryn Morrison became the first woman to serve in the Wisconsin Senate. Since her inauguration, there have been 17 women senators, 13 with previous experience in the assembly. Senator Carol Roessler, first elected to the senate in a 1987 special election, is currently senior in senate service. Senator Barbara Lorman, who served in eight sessions, beginning with the 1979 session, has the longest tenure for a woman senator to date.

### The Assembly

Of the 22 women elected to the 2001 Assembly, five are in their first term. This compares to a record nine who were newly elected to the 1993 session.

Representative Annette Polly Williams, who begins her 11th session in the 2001 Assembly, is currently the senior woman representative. Her record approaches that of Representative Esther Doughty Luckhardt whose tenure of 11 sessions, beginning with the 1963 session, is the longest period served by any woman legislator in either house. Representative Susan Engeleiter appears to be the youngest woman ever elected to the Wisconsin Legislature. She was 22 years old when she took office in January 1975.

### Leadership

Senator Mary Panzer and Representative Shirley Krug currently hold the highest ranking among the women legislators as Republican minority leader in the senate and Democratic minority leader in the assembly, respectively. Over the years, women have held increasingly important positions of leadership. In 1976, Senator Kathryn Morrison was the first woman to serve on the powerful Joint Committee on Finance, and Representative Mary Lou Munts was the first woman to cochair that committee in the 1983 session. In the 1985 session, Senator Susan Engeleiter was the first woman to be chosen senate minority leader, and Representative Betty Jo Nelsen was elected the first woman minority leader of the assembly in 1987.
