At the July 27, 2016 meeting on the Study Committee on Access to Civil Legal Services, members requested that the following information be gathered and distributed in preparation for the committee's September 14, 2016 meeting:

1. Information about how other states provide civil legal services to individuals who cannot afford an attorney.

In 2011, the American Bar Foundation published a report entitled, *Access Across America*, which was an attempt at a comprehensive mapping of the U.S. civil justice infrastructure.
