Dear Senator Darling and Representative Nygren:

In accordance with Wisconsin Stat. § 51.06 (8), enclosed is a copy of the report (also available online at <https://www.dhs.wisconsin.gov/publications/p01054.pdf>) on people relocated and diverted from nursing homes, intermediate care facilities for individuals with intellectual disabilities (ICFs-IID), and state centers for people with developmental disabilities in state fiscal year (SFY) 2014. This report provides information related to four programs, the ICF-MR Restructuring Initiative, the Community Integration Program (CIP) 1A, the Community Relocation Initiative, and the Nursing Home Diversion Initiative.

The Department's relocation and diversion programs have been successful, providing the opportunity in SFY 2014 for 631 elderly individuals and people with physical and developmental disabilities to live in community-based settings, who otherwise would have resided in ICFs-IID and nursing facilities. Since SFY 2006, 5,705 elders and people with physical and developmental disabilities have successfully relocated from institutional settings and an additional 1,270 people were diverted from admission to a nursing home through the Department's programs. The quality of life for these 6,975 individuals has been enhanced through the opportunity to live in the community, be near family and friends, and to be more fully involved in community activities.

Highlights of the relocation and diversions initiatives over the past nine years (SFY 2006 through SFY 2014) include:

- 906 people with developmental disabilities, many of whom resided in institutions for decades, moved to the community and participated in community activities that were not previously available.
- 3,257 frail elders who resided in nursing facilities chose to live in the community near their families and friends.

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- 1,542 people with physical disabilities chose to live in the community where they were able to access community activities, rather than live in nursing facilities.
- People with intellectual or developmental disabilities have been served in the community at a cost that is within the anticipated institutional budget for this population.
- Frail elders and people with physical disabilities are being served in the community at a cost below that of institutional care, resulting in savings under the Medical Assistance Program of \$1.675 million in SFY 2014 for the people relocated during the year.
- 945 elders and 325 people with physical disabilities, who were determined to be at imminent risk of having to move to a nursing facility, were able to remain in community-based settings via the availability of diversion funding.

SFY 2014 REPORT on RELOCATIONS and DIVERSIONS from INSTITUTIONS As required by Wisconsin Stat. § 51.06 (8) Executive Summary

The Department of Health Services (DHS) has been providing elders and people with physical and developmental disabilities residing in nursing facilities and Intermediate Care Facilities for Individuals with Intellectual Disabilities (ICFs-IID) the opportunity to relocate to community-based settings through three program initiatives. DHS also provides support to a limited number of people who are at imminent risk of entering a nursing home to be diverted from a nursing home admission and remain in community settings.

DHS's relocation and diversion programs have been highly successful over the years, providing the opportunity in State Fiscal Year (SFY) 2014 for 631 elderly people and people with physical and developmental disabilities to live in community settings, closer to family and friends and community activities. As shown in the summary table below, 402 people (63.71% of all relocations and diversions) were frail elders, 180 (28.53%) were persons with physical disabilities, and 49 people (7.77%) were people with developmental disabilities.

This report provides information consistent with prior year reports, although the movement from the legacy waiver programs (Community Options Program and Community Integration Program) has significantly altered the way that people transition from institutional settings to the community. While in Family Care, a person can enter a nursing home when necessary due to health conditions and remain enrolled in Family Care. People in nursing homes can also enroll in Family Care, but it may take several months before they transition to the community. When the need for nursing home care ends, the person can move back to a home in the community without re-enrolling. These transitions that occur within the Family Care program do not meet the definition for transitions used in this report and are not captured in this data.

From SFY 2006 until the end of SFY 2014, 5,705 elders and people with physical and developmental disabilities successfully relocated from institutional settings and an additional 1,270 people were diverted from admission to a nursing home through DHS programs. The quality of life for these 6,975 people has been enhanced through the opportunity to live in the community and be near family and friends and more fully engaged in community activities.

*DHS does not operate a specific diversion initiative for people with developmental disabilities, but new placements into institutions are limited and new people are enrolled in home and community-based programs each year on a regular basis, essentially diverting people with developmental disabilities from institutional care.

Highlights of the relocation and diversions initiatives over the past nine years (SFY 2006 to SFY 2014) include:

- 906 people with developmental disabilities, many of whom resided in institutions for decades, moved to the community and participated in community activities that were not available to them when they resided in institutions.
- 3,257 frail elders who resided in nursing facilities chose to live in the community near their families and friends. Prior to this initiative, these people would have been on a waiting list for Medicaid home and community-based waiver services. Few would have had the opportunity to return to the community.
- 1,542 people with physical disabilities chose to live in the community where they were able to access community activities, rather than live in nursing facilities.
- People with intellectual or developmental disabilities have been served in the community at a cost within the anticipated institutional budget for this population.
- Frail elders and people with physical disabilities are being served in the community at a cost below that of institutional care, resulting in a level of savings under the Medical Assistance Program in SFY 2014 of \$1.675 million for the people relocated during the year.
- 945 elders and 325 people with physical disabilities, who were determined to be at imminent risk of needing to move to a nursing facility, were able to remain in community-based settings because diversion funding was made available.

In 2007, DHS was awarded a federal “Money Follows the Person” (MFP) grant to support rebalancing of the long-term care system through additional relocations from institutions to the community. Starting October 2007 and continuing to October 2016, the federal government pays a match rate exceeding the standard Medicaid matching rate for the costs of certain relocated people during their first year in the community. In SFY 2014, a total of 88 people (17.5% of the 502 relocated people considered in this report) also participated in Money Follows the Person. While a total of 297 people enrolled in MFP during SFY 2014, over 200 of MFP enrollees did not meet the criteria for relocations used in this report.

Background

Relocation Initiatives

DHS provides elders and people with physical and developmental disabilities residing in nursing facilities and ICFs-IID the opportunity to relocate to community-based living arrangements under the following three programs:

- ICF-IID Restructuring Initiative
- Community Integration Program 1A
- Community Relocation Initiative

Although the funding mechanisms for these programs were established under the legacy Community Integration Programs and Community Options Program waivers, persons who relocated from institutions to Family Care, Family Care Partnership and PACE are included in the ICF-IID Restructuring Initiative, CIP 1A, and Community Relocation Initiative numbers.

ICF-IID Restructuring Initiative

The ICF-IID Restructuring Initiative serves persons with developmental disabilities receiving active treatment in a non-state-owned Intermediate Care Facility for Individuals with Intellectual Disabilities (ICF-IID) or a non-state-owned nursing facility (relocations from the three state centers for people with developmental disabilities are part of the Community Integration Program 1A, described below). The initiative was authorized in the 2003-05 biennial budget bill and became effective on January 1, 2005. Under the initiative, counties are required to prepare a community plan for every person residing in an ICF-IID and for every person seeking admission to an ICF-IID. The plan must be submitted to the court and the court must consider the plan, along with other information presented to the court. If the court determines that the community is the most integrated setting appropriate to the needs of the individual, then the court must order the person to be served in the community. If the person with a developmental disability was a resident of an ICF-IID or a nursing facility, then the initiative allows money that was previously used to fund his/her institutional care to follow the person into the community to fund community-based care. Funding can also be used under this initiative for community placements for people relocated from facilities that are closing or downsizing. Under this initiative, the entire cost of the person's care plan is funded by state and federal funding. Therefore, no county tax levy funding has been required to fund these relocations.

In SFY 2014, a total of 48 people with developmental disabilities moved into the community from non-state-owned ICFs-IID and nursing facilities. In their new community settings, these people had their care needs fully met and participated in community activities that were not available to them when they resided in institutions.

As a result of the ICF-IID Restructuring Initiative and other factors, the long term care system for people with developmental disabilities has been significantly rebalanced towards community settings. Since the start of this initiative in January 2005 through SFY 2014, a total of 892 people transitioned to community settings through the ICF-IID Restructuring Initiative. In June of 2014, only 169 people were living in the 9 remaining ICFs-IID excluding the state centers. This is 20% fewer people than were living in those facilities a year earlier. Twenty-three ICFs-IID, or more than 70% of all ICFs-IID other than the state centers, have closed over the course of the initiative.

Community Integration Program (CIP) 1A

The Community Integration Program 1A supports relocations of people with developmental disabilities from the long-term care programs in the three state centers for people with developmental disabilities to homes in the community. The CIP 1A program began in 1981. While prior to SFY 2010 there was an upper limit on an individual’s daily costs under the CIP 1A program of \$325, the 09-11 biennial budget changed this. Effective SFY 2010, DHS adopted a universal budgeting methodology that eliminated upper limit on daily costs and provided the full funding needed in the community for each relocated resident. In SFY 2014, one individual (who had previously resided in the community as a CIP 1A participant) relocated from a long-term care program in a state center to the community.

Community Relocation Initiative

The Community Relocation initiative provides elders and persons with physical disabilities residing in nursing homes the opportunity to relocate to community settings. People receiving care in nursing homes have a choice to remain in their current setting or move to the community when their care needs can be met at home, in an apartment, or in an assisted living setting. The funding being used for a person’s institutional care “follows” the person into the community to be used in the Medicaid home and community-based services waiver. The Community Relocation Initiative was authorized in the 05-07 biennial budget bill and began in August 2006. In SFY 2014, a total of 453 people relocated from nursing homes under the Community Relocation Initiative. Of the 453 total, 293 were elders and 160 were people with physical disabilities. These people chose to live in the community where they could be closer to family and friends and more fully access community activities.

As shown in the chart below, people of all ages chose to relocate to community settings under the Community Relocation Initiative in SFY 2014. It is noteworthy that 224 people, or 49%, of the people who chose to relocate were ages 75 or older, and 2 people were ages 100 or older.

As shown in the chart below, people with both relatively short-term and relatively long-term stays in nursing homes chose to relocate in SFY 2014. The number of relocations under the 100-day mark has remained stable between SFY 2013 and SFY 2014. In SFY 2013, 123 people (31% of people

relocated) had nursing home stays of 100 days or less, while 272 people (approximately 69% of people relocated) had been in the nursing home more than 100 days. Of the people relocated in SFY 2014, 119, or 26%, had been in the nursing home for 100 days or less, while 334, or approximately 74%, had been in the nursing home more than 100 days.

Diversions

Nursing Home Diversion Program

The Nursing Home Diversion program targets people who are at imminent risk of entering a nursing home and the program provides support to divert those people from nursing home admission, helping them remain in community settings. The program was authorized in 2005 Wisconsin Act 355 and began in April 2006. Participants in this program are served under the Community Integration Program II (CIP II) Medicaid home and community-based services waiver. To be eligible for these diversion funds, a person is required to meet certain risk criteria as defined DHS, as well as meet the Medicaid functional and financial eligibility criteria for CIP II. The statute originally authorized DHS to provide an enhanced CIP II rate for up to 150 people who are diverted from imminent entry into a nursing home and to provide diversion opportunities for additional people, subject to the concurrence of the legislature. Subsequent to the original legislation, the Legislature passed and the Governor approved 2009 Wisconsin Act 277. This act, which became effective in May 2011, removed the limitation on the number of CIP II nursing home diversion slots available to be used by counties to divert high-risk elders and persons with physical disabilities from entering nursing homes.

To be eligible for diversion funding, an individual must meet all of the following criteria:

- Belong to a target group served by CIP II (elderly age 65 or older and/or have a physical disability);
- Be functionally and financially eligible for the CIP II program;
- Reside or intend to reside in a community setting that is eligible for CIP II;
- Meet high-risk criteria for imminent entry into a nursing home; and
- The costs of the person's Medicaid-funded community care plan must be no greater than the Medicaid costs the person would have incurred in the nursing home.

As a part of the diversion initiative, DHS was required to develop and utilize criteria to determine who is at imminent risk of entry into a nursing home. In developing criteria, DHS reviewed national studies, analyzed Wisconsin data, and consulted with county long-term support coordinators and staff. Factors that are considered in the criteria include:

- Meeting an intensive skilled nursing (ISN) level of care;
- Facing an imminent loss of current living arrangement;
- Having a fragile or insufficient informal caregiver arrangement;
- Having a terminal illness; or
- Having multiple other factors that are associated with nursing home entry.

Under the Nursing Home Diversion program in SFY 2014, a total of 129 people were diverted from nursing home admission and remained in community-based settings, staying close to family and friends and involved in the community. Of the total, 109 were elders and 20 were people with physical

disabilities. The diversion program is only available in the 15 counties that are still operating the CIP II waiver as of SFY 2014. The number of counties operating CIP II, and therefore eligible for diversion slots, has decreased over time due to the expansion of Family Care. People are able to access needed community-based services without delay in the other 57 counties where Family Care operates.

People of all ages benefited from the Nursing Home Diversion program in SFY 2014, as shown in the chart below. Significantly, over two-thirds of the people diverted from nursing homes were age 75 or older. The youngest person diverted was age 24.

Nature of Living Arrangement

The following table shows the living arrangement for people relocated in SFY 2014. Most notable is that elderly people, people with physical disabilities and people with developmental disabilities all indicated a preference to relocate to a home or apartment setting rather than a regulated residential setting (Community-Based Residential Facility, Residential Care Apartment Complex, or Adult Family Home). This is demonstrated by the fact that 351 people, or 70%, relocated to a home or apartment. The next most frequent setting was a Community-Based Residential Facility (CBRF), with 22% of relocated people choosing that setting.

Appendix A provides information about the living arrangements for people relocated under the Community Relocation Initiative by the program under which they were served.

The living arrangements of the 129 people diverted from nursing home admission under the Nursing Home Diversion program are summarized below—showing their living arrangement both before and after entering the program. After entering the program, 90% of people remained in the same type of living arrangement as before entering the program.

Duration of Relocations

Of the 453 elders and people with physical disabilities who relocated from nursing homes in SFY 2014, 40 people died and 49 people returned to a nursing home during the fiscal year. The remaining people continue to live in the community and virtually all continue to receive services through Family Care, Family Care Partnership, PACE or the CIP II Medicaid home and community-based services waiver program.

Of the 48 people who relocated from an ICF-IID, one person who relocated in SFY 2014 died during the year. One person was relocated from a long-term program at a state center during the state fiscal year and that person remained in the community for the remainder of SFY 2014. Appendix B provides information on deaths and returns to institutions among people who have moved from ICFs-IID and state centers since SFY 2006.

Costs Under the Medicaid Program

Medicaid costs were calculated for both the period when the person was in an institution and the period when the person was living in the community to determine the net Medicaid cost of the relocation programs. The analysis examined the following two components: (a) the institutional or Medicaid home and community-based services waiver costs; and (b) other Medicaid costs, termed Medicaid Card Costs, which include the Medicaid costs for personal care services, therapeutic services, and all other non-home and community-based waiver Medicaid services. This provides a comprehensive presentation of the person's Medicaid costs in each setting.

Community Relocation Initiative

As summarized in the table below, in SFY 2014 the average daily Medicaid cost in the nursing facility for Community Relocation Initiative (CRI) participants before they relocated under the initiative was \$142.06. In contrast, the average daily Medicaid cost in the community after relocation for these same people was \$104.40. Community relocations under the CRI were cost effective, producing an average daily savings of \$37.6, or a 27% Medicaid cost reduction.

As shown in the table below, the total Medicaid community cost in SFY 2014 of serving the 453 people who relocated to the community under the Community Relocation Initiative was approximately

\$4.64 million. If instead these relocated people had remained in their institutional settings during this time period, then their total Medicaid services cost would have been almost \$6.32 million. Due to the difference between institutional and community costs, the Community Relocation Initiative produced total savings of more than \$1.67 million in SFY 2014.

ICF-IID Restructuring

When implemented in 2005, the ICF-IID Restructuring Initiative established an amount of funding to be used for the costs of all people eligible for the initiative either residing in institutional or community settings. DHS was expected to manage the costs of serving those people remaining in institutions and the costs of new community relocations within this global ICF-IID Restructuring budget. As managed long-term care (Family Care) and IRIS have expanded to a large portion of the state, DHS has moved away from this budgeting mechanism for the ICF-IID Restructuring Initiative. DHS most recently estimated this budget to be \$65.5 million All Funds (AF). The SFY 2014 cost of serving the ICF-IID Restructuring population in both institutions and community settings is estimated to be roughly \$36 million AF.

CIP 1A Program

As noted above, the state Medicaid program funds the actual community cost of people with developmental disabilities relocated under the CIP 1A program. Upon a person’s relocation under CIP 1A, the institutional costs at the state center where the relocating individual resided are decreased by the amount of the individual care plan, making the program cost-neutral.

Nursing Home Diversion Program

The average daily community Medicaid cost per person served under the Nursing Home Diversion Program in SFY 2014 was \$67.25. Of this total, \$46.68 accounted for Medicaid waiver costs and \$20.57 accounted for Medicaid card costs. The projected daily Medicaid cost per person of serving this population in a nursing home was \$139.03, based on the projected average facility cost for non-developmentally disabled nursing home residents in SFY 2014 and estimated card services for the Community Relocation Initiative prior to relocation.

The estimated cost of the people served under the Nursing Home Diversion program in SFY 2014 was \$1.5 million AF. The projected cost of serving these people in nursing homes, if they had needed to enter a nursing home, during the same time period was \$3.13 million AF.

Impact on Health and Safety

Medicaid Home and Community-Based Services Waiver Quality Assurance

Assuring the health and safety of frail elders and people with developmental and physical disabilities is a paramount goal of DHS—regardless of whether people live in an institution or in the community. All of the people relocated under the programs described in this report are participants in one of DHS’s

Medicaid Home and Community-Based Waivers, which include Family Care, the self-directed IRIS waiver, and the traditional waivers (Community Integration Program and Community Options Program). All of these waivers operate under plans approved through the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services. These plans include extensive risk assessment and mitigation, as well as quality assurance and quality improvement protocols intended to ensure the health and safety of participants.

All participants have highly individualized support and service plans that promote person-centered outcomes, informed choices and community participation, in addition to addressing health and safety needs. Care management staff are required to have contact with participants at regular intervals, including face-to-face visits, to ensure that services and supports are being delivered as required and to address new needs that might arise. For persons relocating from institutions, a visit will occur shortly after the move to the community to assess the adequacy of the support and service plan and identify any issues that occurred after the move.

For all participants, ongoing assessments are methodically completed and updated. In Family Care, care planning is carried out by an interdisciplinary team, which includes a nurse. Many counties also employ nursing personnel as part of their care management teams under the traditional waivers. When unmet needs are identified, the care plan is modified to address those needs. In addition to waiver services and supports, people also receive community health services such as physician and dental visits, hospital care, personal care in their home, and pharmacy.

DHS requires Family Care Managed Care Organizations (MCOs), the IRIS Consultant Agency, and counties that administer the traditional waivers to have a system to ensure waiver participants are adequately protected from physical, verbal, and sexual abuse, as well as maltreatment, neglect, financial exploitation, and violation of their rights under law. DHS also requires these entities to have an effective response system when incidents of this kind arise and mechanisms for reporting incidents to DHS.

DHS uses state staff, or contractors, to monitor the extent to which waiver agencies comply with waiver requirements. This oversight also includes paper reviews and on-site visits using a variety of sources such as case records, satisfaction surveys, and visits with program participants.

Regulatory Oversight

The Division of Quality Assurance conducts regular on-site surveys of licensed community residential facilities (3-4 bed adult family homes and community-based residential facilities) using state guidelines and standards. Counties and managed care organizations are responsible for ensuring high quality services and environments for people living in smaller settings. Residential and day-service providers also have procedures and practices that maintain each person's safety and health. They interact with each person on a constant basis, monitor medical conditions, provide structured social and environmental situations, and give sufficient supports to people with special needs.

DHS oversees these programs and service delivery systems by having staff disbursed throughout the state to facilitate and monitor these efforts through several types of activities, including: random unannounced visits, in-depth annual plan review, and ongoing dialogue with all stakeholders (including consumers and their families/guardians). DHS issues guidelines and establishes policies and procedures whenever necessary to address gaps that are identified or suspected.

Actual or suspected events

Any actual or suspected event that threatens the health or safety of an individual is investigated and reviewed by each provider and waiver agency. Waiver agencies are required to report all such instances to state-level quality assurance staff or contractors, who, depending on the nature and seriousness of the report, may investigate or involve others, such as police or the judicial system.

All deaths in licensed or certified settings are reported to and scrutinized by the state to identify negative trends associated with providers, counties, or the approaches that are used by the service delivery system with the intent of preventing further instances. Concerns are then shared with appropriate entities that are required to make systemic improvements or to take corrective actions in order to create a constant cycle of improvement. Instances of abuse or neglect are remedied swiftly and access to necessary medical services is closely monitored.

Involvement of Guardians or Family Members

Counties are required to prepare a plan for home or community-based care for all people residing in ICFs-IID and nursing homes who are at a developmental disability level of care. For ICFs-IID other than the state centers, these plans are part of the statutorily required annual court review (known as the Watts review) to determine the most integrated setting appropriate to the person's needs. Counties involve guardians in the preparation of these plans and state law requires that the county provide a copy of the plan to the guardian prior to the Watts review.

When a developmentally disabled person is relocated from a state center or other ICF-IID or nursing home facility, the plan for a person's care is signed by the guardian indicating his/her acceptance of the plan. Of the 48 persons relocated under the ICF-IID Restructuring Initiative, and the one person relocated from a state center in SFY 2014, each guardian agreed with the plan that was developed.

Most elderly persons and persons with physical disabilities relocated under the Community Relocation Initiative do not have guardians. However, in cases where people do have guardians, the guardians are involved in the efforts to relocate or divert people from institutions.

For persons who are competent to make their own decisions, family members are involved to the extent preferred by the individual participant. DHS does not keep record of family involvement in care planning for people who are competent to make their own decisions.

Staff turnover

Appendix C provides Calendar Year 2013 staff turnover rates for ICFs-IID and nursing facilities. The attachment lists facilities in order by name and identifies the city or town where the facility is located. Staff turnover rates are provided for both full-time and part-time staff for three professions: Registered Nurses (RNs), Licensed Practical Nurses (LPNs), and Nursing Assistants (NAs).

The staff turnover rate was calculated by the Division of Quality Assurance. Calculations were based upon information submitted in response to the 2013 Annual Staffing Survey. In this survey, each facility provided information about the number of full-time and part-time RNs, LPNs, and nursing assistants hired in 2013. Each facility also provided the total number of full-time and part-time RNs, LPNs, and NAs employed as of December 31, 2013, and their length of service. The staff turnover rate for each category was calculated by dividing the number of new employees hired in 2013 in that category (e.g., full-time RNs) by the total number of employees in that category on December 31,

2013. The resulting decimal was multiplied by 100 to produce a percentage. For example, if a nursing home hired 2 full-time RNs in 2013 and had 8 full-time RNs as of December 31, 2013, then the full-time RN turnover rate was calculated as 25% (2 divided by 8 = .25; .25 X 100 = 25%).
